

A. Software in the lab: (These programs come up on the screen automatically when you log-in)

- 1) The **Puntos** software installed on every computer in the lab
 - This program has lots to offer and it goes right with the book
 - Don't forget to try watching the **Puntos videos!**
- 2) ¡Claro que sí!
- 3) **Spanish Multimedia**
 - Very implicit but detailed lessons on grammar points that we're covering. (Best for inductive learners).
- 4) **Who is Oscar lake?**
 - A Spanish version of "Where in the World is Camen San Diego?" You need to get the CD at the desk.

B. Websites: (1-6 are mainly sites for language *practice*. They're good but be careful not to burn-out on them. 7-10 are more for real language *use*.
